Report of the directors (incorporating the trustees' report) for the year ended 31 March 2016

The directors present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2016. The directors, who are also trustees of Sunart Community Company for the purposes of charity law and who served during the year and up to the date of this report are set out on page 1.

Structure, governance and management

The company is managed by a Board of Directors who are elected to the Board in accordance with the procedures outlined in the company's Articles of Association. The Sunart Community Council and the Strontian Angling Association each have a seat on the Board. Up to three directors also may be co-opted by the Board to serve until the date of the next AGM. Directors are provided with an induction pack, and sign up to a Code of Conduct and provide a register of interests to promote transparency.

The directors set the strategy and policy of the company, and generally control and supervise the company's activities, monitor its financial position, and as there are no employees, or managers in post, are responsible for the day to day management of the company.

The members of the company consist of the subscribers who are ordinary members. Ordinary members are those who are over 18 years of age, are ordinarily resident in the community, are on the electoral register and who support the objects of the company. Members may be required to pay an annual subscription which (if requested) is set at the AGM. There was no Membership Fee for 2015-2016. The company must maintain no fewer than 20 members.

Risk

The directors have conducted their own review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed and systems have been established to mitigate those risks.

Reserves

The policy of the charity is to retain sufficient funds required to meet the ongoing running costs in respect of insurance costs, levies etc. The Board is of the opinion that the balances held at the year end by the charity were prudent to ensure that these commitments could be met.

Objectives and activities

The objectives of the charity are to manage community land and associated assets for the benefit of the Community and the public in general as an important part of the protection and sustainable development of Scotland's natural environment, where "sustainable development" means development which meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs.

In furtherance of its aims and objectives, the company initiated and participated in a number of community based projects during the year and also organised several fundraising ventures in support of the aims.

Achievements and performance

Community Hydro Scheme

This year saw the Hydro Scheme (now operated by Sunart Community Renewables) being completed and "switched on" in October 2015. Under a Memorandum of Agreement between the two companies, any net profit after payment of interest on loans and equity, will be handed to the community company for distribution in the form of grants. 2016 will see the formation of the Sunart Common Good Fund, run by a panel of local volunteers and administered by the community company. It is likely that the Panel will consider requests for funds twice per year. Volunteers for the Panel will be chosen in May 2016.

Report of the directors (incorporating the trustees' report) for the year ended 31 March 2016

To demonstrate the importance of the hydro for the village, SCR donated £4,000 to the community company to be given out at a family ceilidh in March 2016. Attendees were able to choose where to spend their "hydro-fiver" money by placing it in a box each labelled with one of 25 local groups. All 25 beneficiaries benefitted on the night

Fishing

The Strontian/Polloch/Loch Doilet Fisheries are managed by Sunart Community Company and Strontian Angling Association to restore in-stream and riparian bio-diversity and develop a sustainable angling resource.

The Strontian River restoration program is being guided by the Lochaber Fisheries Trust Biologists and their advice and work on this project has been invaluable. 2015 saw volunteers from the angling association and staff from LFT monitoring the river and rearing brood stock in the associations own hatchery. This future of this project has been secured thanks to £6,900 from the Scottish Landfill Communities Fund, via Highland Council, and matched with support from Marine Harvest (Scotland) and a donation from the Ninevah Trust.

Land

We continue to strengthen the balance sheet of the company, having last year purchased land associated with the Hydro, we also successfully applied to acquire the plot of land beside the old schoolhouse from the Forestry Commission Scotland. Conveyancing will now be completed in 2016.

Housing & Planning

SCC employed an intern, Sarah Watson, from May to July 2015 to undertake a Housing Needs Survey of all Sunart Residents. The final report was made possible with assistance from the Highland Small Communities Housing Trust. The report highlighted that there is a need for more affordable property locally, whether rented housing or affordable land for people to build their own homes on. There is also evidence that there will be a need for some form of sheltered or supported housing for older people in the years to come

In 2014 the SCC published the Community Action Plan (assisted by CADISPA) which outlined "WHAT" residents felt was needed in terms of services and support. The next issue was getting some idea about WHERE any new developments should take place. As part of the Strontian Development Group, Chaired by Cllr Baxter, SCC volunteers worked with HSCHT, Rural Design Architects from Skye (and funded through Sunart Community Council, HIE, Lochaber Housing and SCC), a "Masterplan" for developments in the village was written. This involved a drop-in session in January where local residents gave their views on various pieces of land in the village. This was published in the Spring and submitted to Highland Council for including in the new West Highland Local Plan, to be published in 2017.

Strontian Jetty

With the support of Highlands and the Islands Enterprise the Strontian Jetty was surveyed and estimates obtained as to the likely costs of repair and upgrade.

Consequently a formal request for the transfer of the land from Highland Council to the community has been lodged. In addition the process of transferring the Crown Estates lease of the jetty from Highland Council to SCC has also begun. In February 2016 the Sunart Moorings Association AGM agreed to transfer its assets to the company so that the jetty slipway and moorings could be run together.

Hopefully 2016 should see the asset transfer process completed.

Floating Free Church - Raising the Anchor Project

We are helping progress this heritage initiative by handling the fundraising in partnership with the local steering group, chaired by a Community Councillor. Using the Community company's charitable status, a lottery grant of has been submitted for what is likely to be a £15,000 project. A Crowdfunding appeal will be launched in 2016.

Networking

Two SCC directors attended a Development Trusts Association Scotland event in the Outer Isles which was most useful. Encouragingly Strontian is right up there with other communities and with the launch of the Hydro Scheme, Strontian is now seen as one of the leading communities in the region.

Financial review

This continues to play a vital part in keeping the Company working and paying for ongoing costs such as insurance, maintenance of communal areas of the village and distributing small grants to local community groups.

Our annual Barbecue at the Sunart Show made £950 profit, and the Christmas Auction made over £1250. We also raised just over £200 at the ceilidh that was part of Visit Scotland's celebration of Sunart. Our thanks go out to so many people that got involved: flipping burgers, buttering rolls, donating goods and, of course, spending money!

A grant of £200 was made to the local Scout group to run the village firework display, and £500 to help support the Strontian Community Schoolbuilding Group begin initial feasibility work.

Plans for future periods

With the support from Highlands & Islands Enterprise the company looks forward to appointing our first employees in summer 2016 and will thus create two part time jobs for the area. Amongst other things they will be helping to complete the jetty project, assist the Primary School Building Group and undertake a feasibility study into the idea of a community hub for the village.

Statement of directors' responsibilities

The directors (who are also trustees of Sunart Community Company under charity law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

Report of the directors (incorporating the trustees' report) for the year ended 31 March 2016

The directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), and the provisions of the trust deed. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Notes to financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2016

1. Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the year and the preceding year.

1.1. Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities published on 16/07/14, the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015). Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

1.2. Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable. Grants where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.

Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.

Gifts donated for resale are included as incoming resources within activities for generating funds when they are sold.

Grants, including grants for the purchase of fixed assets, are recognised in full in the statement of financial activities in the year in which they are receivable.

1.3. Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

1.4. Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Land for Turbine House - 2% straight line

Purposes of restricted funds

The Community Land restricted fund represents grants received towards the purchase of community land and fishing rights in 2006.

The land for the Dam was purchased for £2,000 funded in part by a grant of £1,000 from the Community Council.

The remaining balance of £619 was utilised against expenditure on the Housing Needs Analysis of £1,220 and has been transferred to match this expenditure.

Total grants of £9,754 were received in the year from Marine Harvest, Ninevah Trust and EB Scotland for the Fisheries Project. Expenditure of £4,948 was paid in the year relating to this project giving an amount of £4,806 carried forward.

A grant of £3,540 from HIE was received in the year for jetty and land valuations. This was fully spent in the year on valuation (£1,500) and survey fees (£2,040).

£4,000 was received in the year from Sunart Community Renewables for local groups. Donations made to these groups totalled £3,290. The groups that were awarded grants in the year are listed in note 7.

Purposes of designated funds

Land for the turbine house was purchased by SCC but was immediately leased to Sunart Community Renewables with a lease premium which matched the purchase price.

Depreciation of £800 was charged this year against the cost of the land.

20. Company limited by guarantee

Sunart Community Company is a company limited by guarantee and accordingly does not have a share capital.

Every member of the company undertakes to contribute such amount as may be required not exceeding £1 to the assets of the charitable company in the event of its being wound up while he or she is a member, or within one year after he or she ceases to be a member.
